It's true! Each year, 10 million animals (including frogs, cats, and fetal pigs) are cruelly killed and then cut up in classrooms across the country—even though humane alternatives exist. Studies have shown that students who use alternatives to dissection perform just as well as—if not better than—students who cut animals up. You don't have to dissect animals. Explain to your teacher that you won't be dissecting and that the Michigan Board of Education policy gives you the right to say no to cutting up animals in Michigan:

The Michigan State Board of Education recognizes that a growing number of students have moral, ethical, religious, or other objections to animal dissection and that modern nonanimal teaching methods (e.g., interactive computer software) are available. ... [T]o accommodate these students and create an inclusive learning environment, any K-12 student who objects to dissecting animals or animal parts should be permitted to opt out of dissection activities without fear of reprisal.

Dissection is unnecessary and cruel. Stand up for animals and exercise your rights. Choose not to dissect.
