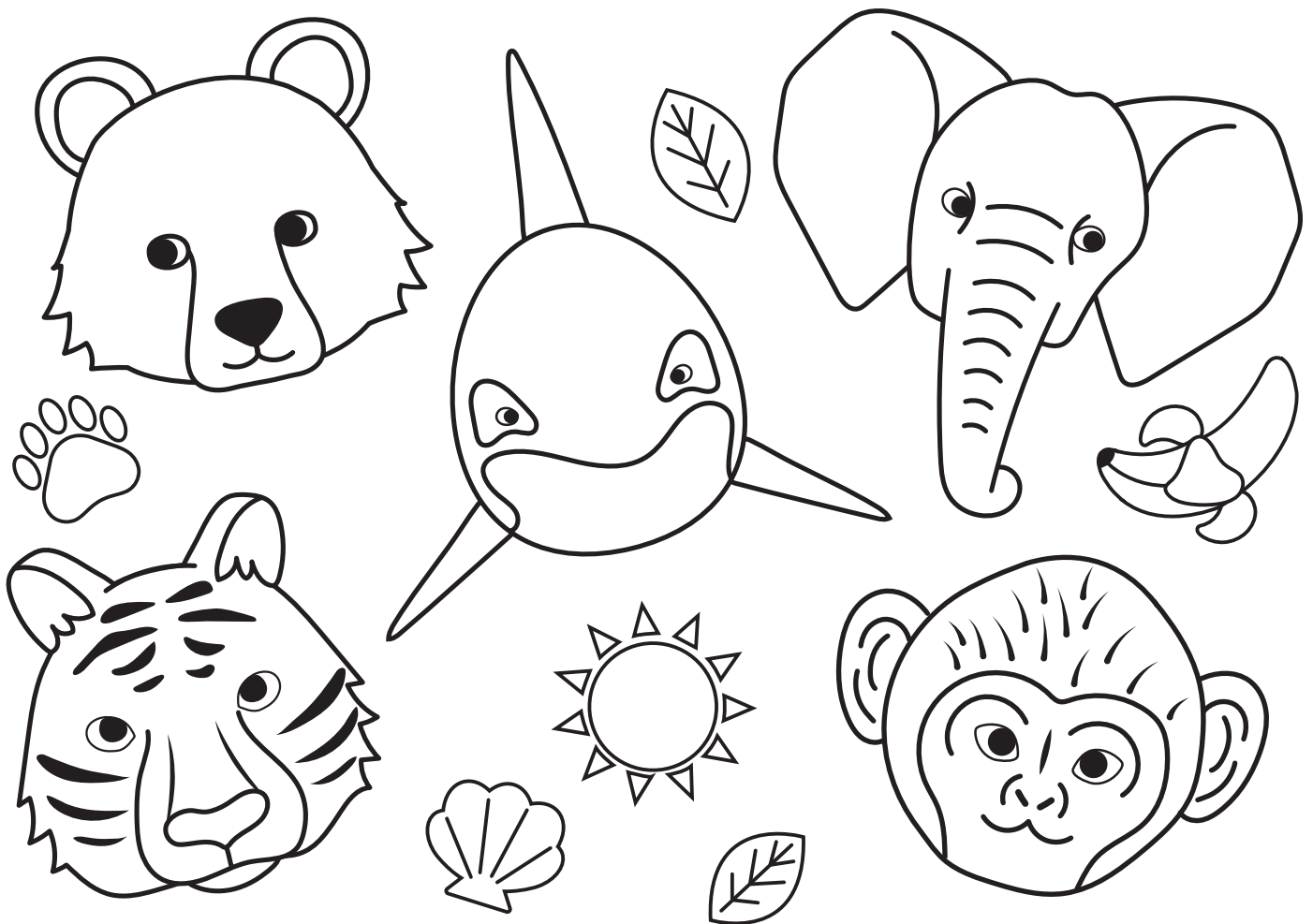

Did you know that places like zoos, circuses, and marine parks take animals away from their families? Yup, they take them away from everything that they love and keep them in teensy cages and tanks. It's not fair!

My orca friends live in little tanks and are forced to do tricks. That's not what they want. My buddy Milo the monkey, who lives at a zoo, says, "Humans would hate it if they had to live like we do." He's right. Just imagine if you were grounded, even though you didn't do anything wrong, and you had to stay in a small room by yourself with nothing to do. Now, imagine that one side of the room had a big glass wall so that people could look at you whenever they wanted to. You wouldn't like that at all! Well, animals in zoos and marine parks are grounded for life.

Like you, all animals have their own personalities. We can also do pretty cool things—like, did you know that I can run as fast as your car? Or that dolphin families have their own special languages? You have a really cool power, too—you can save us! Use your special power of **empathy*** to read our stories in this booklet and learn why animals don't like being in cages, tanks, or chains. Then, find out how you can help us be free!

! *Empathy is the feeling that you get when you put yourself in someone else's shoes—or paws! It lets us see when something is hurting someone else so we can do something about it. So if we can see that animals don't like being in zoos and tanks and would rather be free—just as we would—then we understand that we shouldn't buy tickets to the zoo or a marine park like SeaWorld.

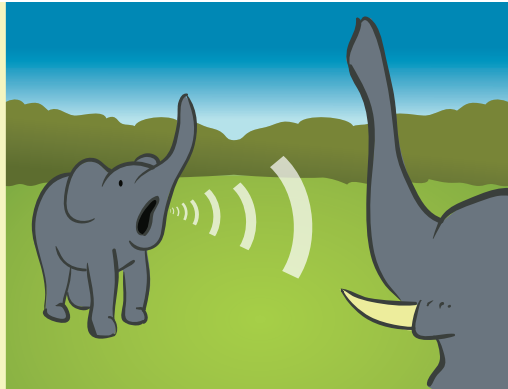
DID YOU KNOW?

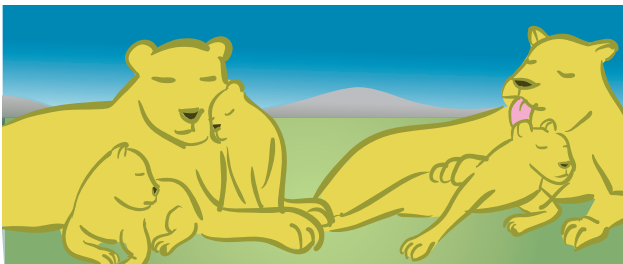
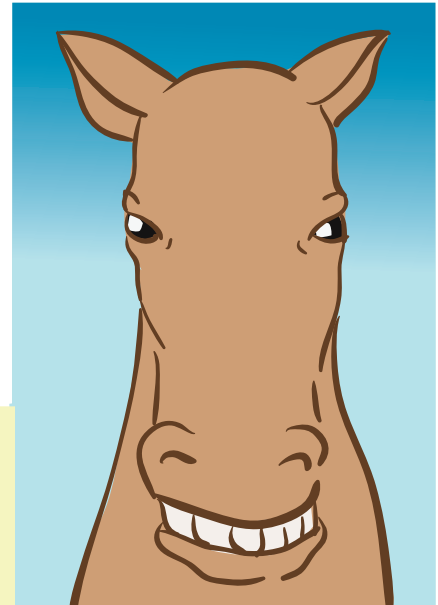


CAMELS ARE BORN WITHOUT HUMPS. MOMS AND BABIES ARE VERY CLOSE AND STAY TOGETHER FOR YEARS. WHEN BABY CAMELS WANT THEIR MOM'S ATTENTION, THEY MAKE A "BAA" SOUND, JUST LIKE A LITTLE LAMB.

ELEPHANTS TALK TO EACH OTHER. THEY USE AT LEAST 70 DIFFERENT TYPES OF CALLS TO COMMUNICATE.



LIKE US, HORSES SHOW THEIR FEELINGS ON THEIR FACES. THEY ALSO HAVE REALLY GOOD HEARING AND EYESIGHT. THEY HAVE ALMOST 360-DEGREE VISION, WHICH MEANS THAT THEY CAN SEE ALMOST EVERYTHING AROUND THEM WITHOUT MOVING THEIR HEADS!



LIONS LIVE IN CLOSE-KNIT FAMILY GROUPS CALLED "PRIDES." LION MOMS ARE VERY LOVING. THEY RAISE THEIR CUBS TOGETHER AND TAKE CARE OF ORPHAN CUBS WHO NEED A MOM.

IN A HERD, ZEBRAS' STRIPES BLEND TOGETHER AND MAKE IT HARD FOR PREDATORS TO SEE ONE INDIVIDUAL ANIMAL. NO TWO ZEBRAS HAVE THE SAME PATTERN OF STRIPES—THEY'RE ONE-OF-A-KIND, JUST LIKE OUR FINGERPRINTS.

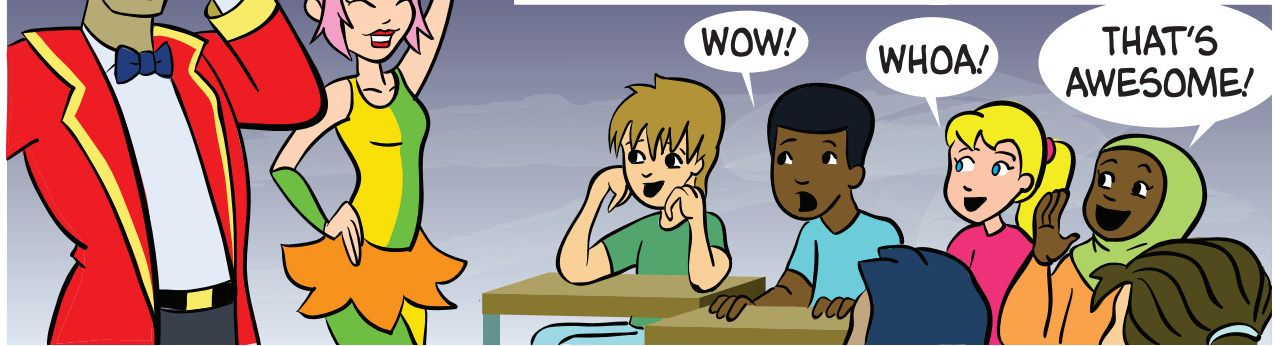




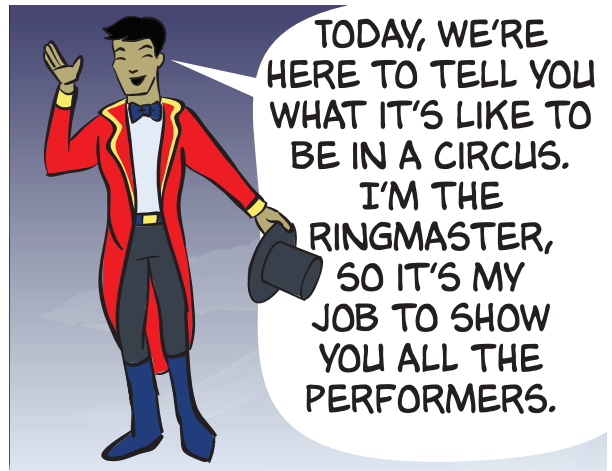

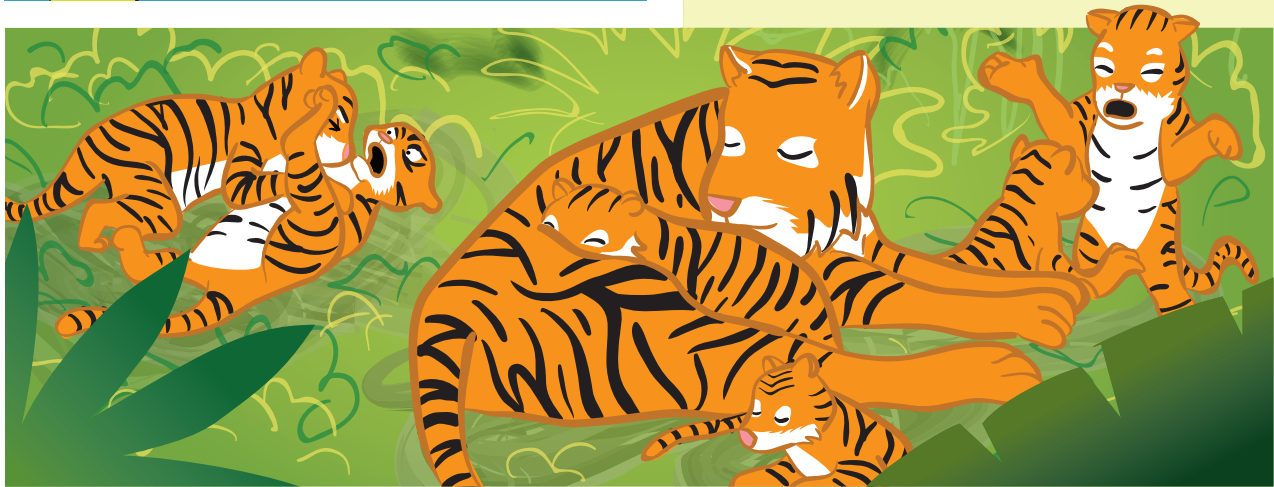
TIGERS ARE THE LARGEST MEMBER OF

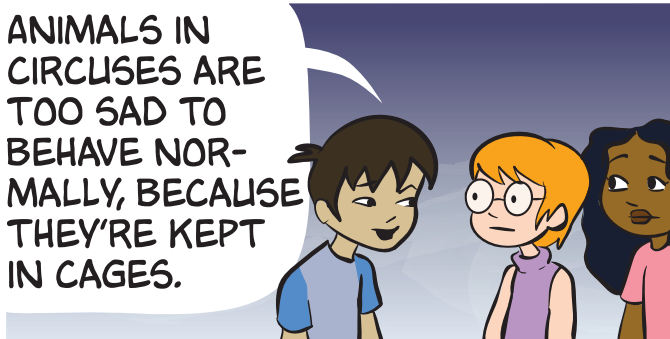

TIGERS ARE SO COOL! THAT'S WHY I WANT TO SEE THEM UP CLOSE.



ANIMALS IN CIRCUSES ARE TOO SAD TO BEHAVE NORMALLY, BECAUSE THEY'RE KEPT IN CAGES.



I USED TO WORK IN A CIRCUS THAT USED ANIMALS. THAT'S WHERE I MET A BEAUTIFUL TIGER NAMED SAM.



SAM HAS THE SAME STORY AS MOST CAPTIVE ANIMALS. HE WAS TAKEN AWAY FROM HIS MOM RIGHT AFTER HE WAS BORN, AND HE NEVER SAW HER AGAIN.



TIGERS ARE REALLY SCARED OF FIRE, BUT SAM WAS EVEN MORE SCARED OF HIS TRAINERS, BECAUSE THEY HIT HIM EVERY TIME HE DIDN'T DO WHAT THEY SAID. ANIMALS IN THE CIRCUS DO TRICKS ONLY BECAUSE THEY'RE SCARED THAT THEIR TRAINERS WILL HURT THEM.

BABY ELEPHANTS ARE CHAINED UP AND HIT WITH WHIPS OR SHARP METAL HOOKS.



HORSES, ZEBRAS, AND CAMELS ARE HURT, TOO.



BETWEEN ACTS, ANIMALS ARE KEPT IN CAGES OR PENS. USUALLY, THE ONLY TIME THEY GET TO BE OUTSIDE THEIR CAGES IS WHEN THEY HAVE TO DO TRICKS IN FRONT OF A CROWD.

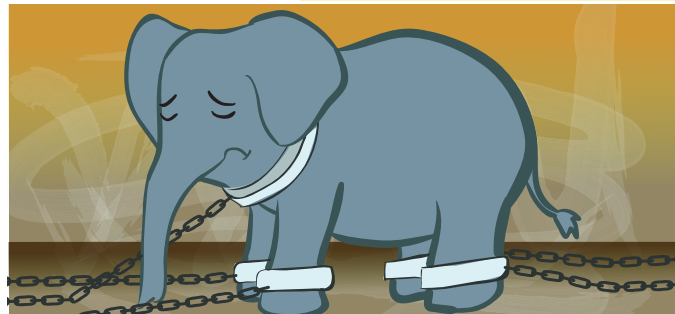


SAM WAS FORCED TO LIVE IN A TINY, DIRTY CAGE. HE HAD TO EAT, DRINK, SLEEP, AND EVEN GO TO THE BATHROOM ALL IN THE SAME SMALL SPACE.



ELEPHANTS ARE CHAINED BY THE LEGS SO THAT THEY CAN'T MOVE. SOMETIMES, THEY'RE CHAINED SO TIGHTLY BY THE NECK THAT THEY CAN'T EVEN MOVE THEIR HEADS.

CIRCUSES TRAVEL FROM TOWN TO TOWN. THAT MEANS THAT ANIMALS ARE LOCKED IN BOXCARS FOR DAYS AT A TIME, EVEN IN VERY HOT OR VERY COLD WEATHER AND OFTEN WITHOUT FOOD, WATER, OR VETERINARY CARE.



FOR ANIMALS, LIFE IN THE CIRCUS IS VERY DIFFERENT FROM LIFE IN THE WILD.



IN THE WILD

TIGERS LOVE THE WATER AND ARE GREAT SWIMMERS! THEY COOL OFF IN STREAMS ON HOT DAYS AND BEAT THE HEAT BY RESTING IN THE SHADE.

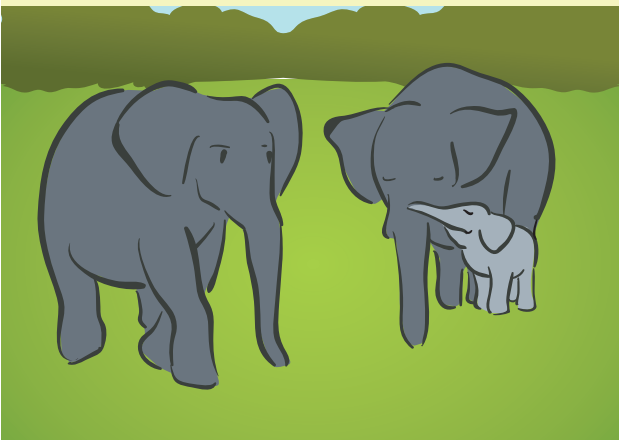


IN THE CIRCUS

TIGERS SPEND MOST OF THEIR TIME IN TINY CAGES, SOMETIMES IN THE HOT SUN WITHOUT ANY SHADE OR WATER.



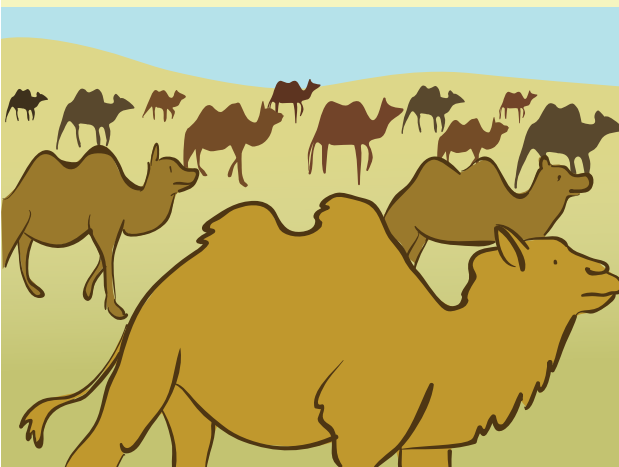
FEMALE ELEPHANTS STAY WITH THEIR FAMILIES FOREVER. MALE ELEPHANTS STAY WITH THEIR FAMILIES FOR 10 TO 15 YEARS.



ELEPHANTS ARE TORN AWAY FROM THEIR FAMILIES WHEN THEY'RE STILL BABIES.



CAMELS LIVE IN HERDS AND ROAM AROUND THE DESERT WITH UP TO 30 OTHER CAMELS.



CAMELS HARDLY GET ANY EXERCISE AND NEVER GET A CHANCE TO MUNCH ON GRASS.



IN THE WILD

LIONS SPEND UP TO 20 HOURS RELAXING AND NAPPING TOGETHER EVERY DAY. THEY'RE MUCH MORE ACTIVE AT NIGHT.



IN THE CIRCUS

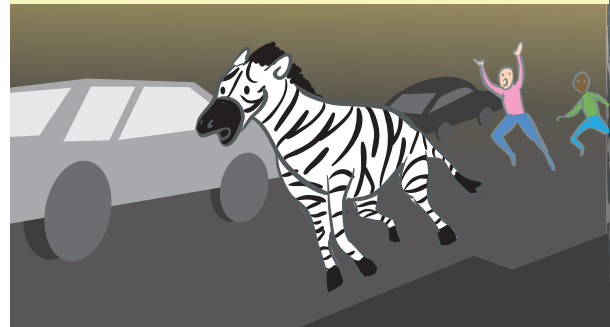
LIONS ARE FORCED TO DO TRICKS DURING THE DAY AND AREN'T ALLOWED TO HANG OUT WITH EACH OTHER WHEN THEY WANT TO.



ZEBRAS LOVE THEIR FAMILIES. THEY TRAVEL IN LARGE HERDS, GRAZING TOGETHER, AND WILL OFTEN FORM A PROTECTIVE CIRCLE AROUND ANY HERD MEMBER WHO IS IN DANGER OR GETS HURT.



ZEBRAS ARE OFTEN FORCED TO LIVE WITH OTHER ZEBRAS THEY DON'T LIKE, AND SOMETIMES, THEY FIGHT. THEY'RE SO MISERABLE IN THE CIRCUS THAT MANY TRY TO ESCAPE BUT END UP INJURING THEMSELVES AND OTHERS.



HORSES ARE FRIENDLY ANIMALS WHO GROOM EACH OTHER AND LIKE TO BE AROUND OTHER HORSES.



HORSES ARE TAKEN AWAY FROM THEIR FRIENDS. LOUD NOISES AND MEANINGLESS STUNTS SCARE THEM, AND IT'S EASY FOR THEM TO GET HURT.

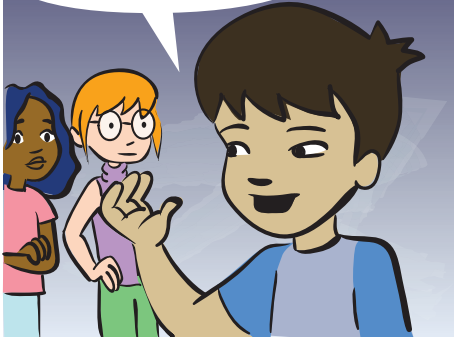

IF PEOPLE STOPPED PAYING TO SEE TIGERS, ZEBRAS, AND OTHER ANIMALS, THESE PLACES WOULD STOP USING THEM. WE NEED TO LET THESE PLACES KNOW THAT WE DON'T WANT ANIMALS TO BE HELD CAPTIVE FOR OUR ENTERTAINMENT.



SPEAK UP FOR ANIMALS! TELL YOUR FAMILY AND FRIENDS WHY ANIMALS SHOULD BE FREE!



ASK YOUR PARENTS TO TELL LOCAL OFFICIALS THAT THEY DON'T WANT TO GO TO CIRCUSES THAT USE ANIMALS AND THAT THEY WANT TO SEE ANIMAL CIRCUSES BANNED!



LEARN HOW YOU CAN HELP ANIMALS. CONTACT GROUPS THAT PROTECT AND CARE FOR THEM.



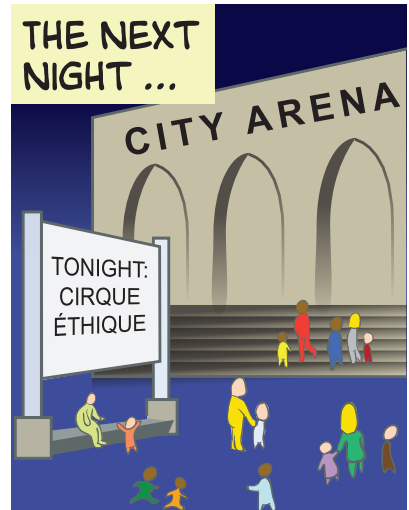
